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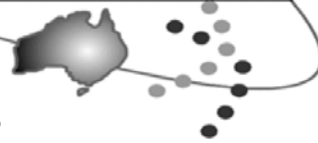
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Yarrow Place Rape & Sexual Assault Service Forensic Medicine Short Course

IT'S A MAN THING: RIDE ROUND THE PLANET FOR PROSTATE CANCER RESEARCH

Melbourne Man to Ride around the World to Support Prostate Cancer Awareness

A Melbourne man will take his campaign for prostate cancer awareness on the road next year, as he circumnavigates the planet by motorcycle in order to boost the profile of the devastating illness. Simon Buckley, 30, of Richmond, Victoria will ride overland from Melbourne to London via South East Asia, China, Mongolia, Russia, Kazakhstan, and Eastern Europe before returning home via the United States, South America and New Zealand. According to Buckley, the 10-month trip aims to demonstrate the lengths individuals will go to in order to get men's health issues on the public agenda.

"Despite recently gaining the support of several high-profile Australian men, prostate cancer research continues to be underfunded and men across the world remain reluctant to openly discuss male health issues," Buckley said. "Prostate cancer is a global issue and, for me, the trip is a grassroots attempt to get ordinary men talking about their health with doctors, family, friends and each other. I want to do something to support men's health and do it in a blokey way."

"Awareness has two different strands. On the one hand, it's about men knowing their options and understanding what the issues are, but it's also about grabbing people's attention and ensuring they are willing to help find a cure."

Buckley said he hopes to help national and local cancer organisations in the cities he visits en route. Buckley has already aligned with the Prostate Cancer Foundation Australia (PCFA) and the European-based Association of International Cancer Research (AICR) and hopes to form further ties locally and overseas during his trip. "The plan is to link in with the activities of different awareness organisations around the globe. I expect to meet with a range of health and community groups and to support their awareness and fundraising efforts by providing them with a reason to reach out to the community and by helping to get the message out there," Buckley said.

While he has no personal experience of the cancer, Buckley argued that education and awareness are essential for all men if the disease is to be effectively tackled. "Prostate cancer is now the most common cancer among men in many countries, and research projects continue to compete for limited funds in the search for a cure," Buckley said. "It's too late to do something about prevention when you are already affected. It's crucial that men understand the value of being proactive about their health in a way that women have been doing for years."

"A recent study by the PCFA showed that while nearly 80% of women felt well informed about breast cancer, only 52% of men felt informed about prostate cancer. The whole idea of the trip is to bridge that gap and help bring awareness of prostate cancer up to the same level."

Buckley said while he had planned a route for the trip, he was flexible about going where his support was needed. "There is a higher mortality rate from prostate cancer in regional Australia due, in part, to a lack of awareness and unwillingness to talk openly about the reality of digital rectal examinations," he said. "I have no problem discussing these sorts of things because I suspect it's going to be a whole lot more uncomfortable to sit on a bike for ten months, than it is to spend a few seconds having a rectal examination."

Currently there are 12,000 new prostate cancer cases diagnosed in Australia each year. The UK registers 30,000 new cases of prostate cancer every year and there are 215,000 in the USA and 20,000 in Canada annually. Buckley said he intends to measure the success of his trip through his involvement in events and by increasing the supporter membership of the RideRightRound website.
